What	is the role of story telling in Waldorf?
ſ	They are the perfect form of delivering lessons, information and values
ſ	Children are able to live into the stories in such a way that they can be transformative
Γ	Stories reach the feeling life of the child
Γ	The whole curriculum of the Waldorf school is based upon the art of telling a good story
Creati	ing Your Own Stories
ſ	Realize that the stories you create are some of the most powerful
Γ	If you are insecure about making up your own begin with a simple bedtime story
Γ	You could even create a story that continues on through several nights or even weeks
Ī	Pedagogical stories are very powerful: You take an issue an create story where the characters are dis-
	guised in some way, where they can work through an issue
ſ	Ideas for stories can be found everywhere: outside your window, situations that happened during the
	day, characters your child loves, animals, things that happened to you as a child or just something fun
How d	lo I choose a story?
Γ	Be clear on what is developmentally appropriate
ſ	Have a sense of the overview of what you are teaching in a main lesson block
ſ	Find stories that not only match you intended curriculum, but that also touch your heart and soul
ſ	Notice if the story lends itself to further activities
ſ	Think about what issues or struggles your child is having and match the story to their situation
Γ	Do you want this to be a recurring story that you can add on to or a one-time tale.
The Presentation	
Γ	Be expressive, but let the story speak for itself
Ţ	Vary the tempo, intonation and timing as a way to create drama and engage the children
j	Have the pictures in mind as you are telling the story
Ī	Use all the senses: see the colors, smell the roses, feel the temperature of the air, hear the sounds
Ţ	Try not to give them the conclusion: describe and let them come to their own conclusions
Ţ	Speak clearly and slowly; it will help the children to settle
Ţ	Be aware of the pitch of your voice: use the full range and resonance
ſ	Move deliberately and consciously

Storytelling Tips

- * When retelling a story, it's ok if you don't get all the details from the original story, just tell it in your own words.
- *Use a theme of ongoing characters or plot (especially with your child as the star)
- *Tell stories from your childhood or family stories
- *Many times you wont have the whole story "fixed" in your mind; it will just unfold while you are telling it.
- *For inspiration, look out the window, around the room or think back over the day. Bring some of "real life" into the story.
- *Use pedagogical stories to help with behavior or to make a point in a gentle way. If your child is nervous or upset about something, create a story with animals or other characters facing the same problem.
